

Warli Art Camp

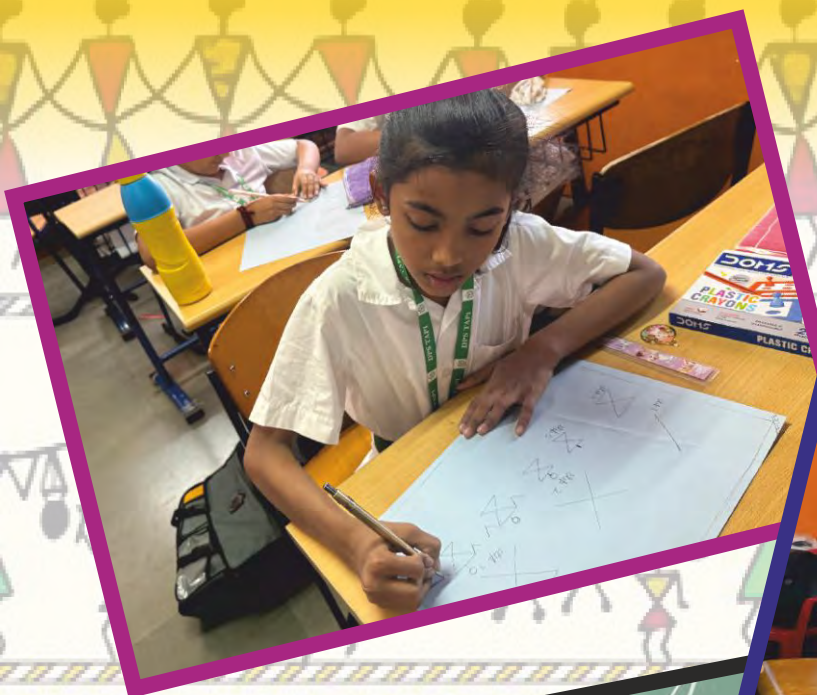

Students depicted farmers harvesting crops and scenes of agricultural life using geometric shapes and stylized figures.

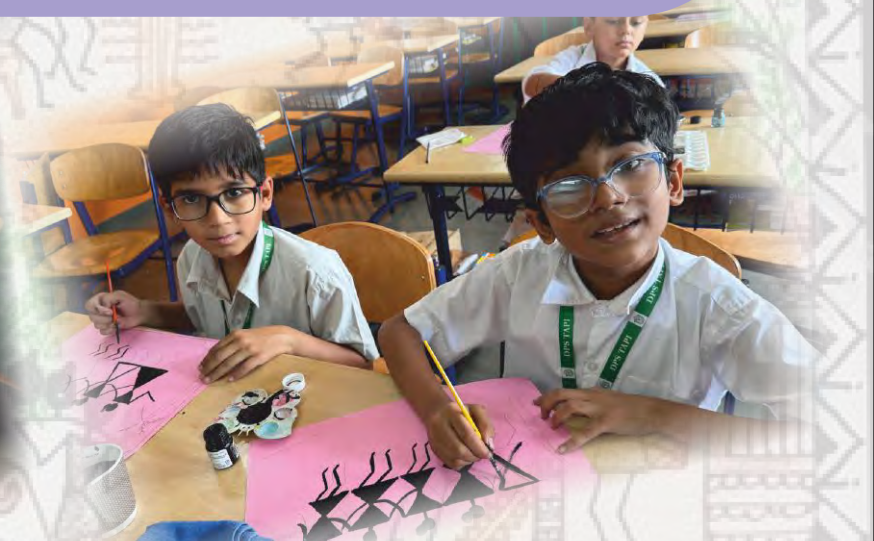
